## Nets and Pieces



#### What is a "Net" ?

- Several stations on one frequency, following organized procedures and controlled by one station (Net Control), for a specific purpose.
- What is "Net Control" ?
  - One station designated as moderator, chairman, team captain, and traffic cop.
  - Maintains order and implements procedures
  - Logs check-ins and activities
- Directed vs. Open Net
  - Directed Nets operate under strict procedures and are managed by Net Control. Stations talk with Net Control, not directly to each other.
  - Open Nets more relaxed, less formal. Net control maintains general order. Can tighten procedures if required.



# Tactical vs. FCC Call Signs



Tactical Call Sign: A special temporary call sign assigned to an individual station or location for use during the net.

- "Net Control", "Rest Stop 1", "SAG Van 3", "Kitchen 2", etc.
- Used for efficiency and continuity as operators change shifts.
- Easier to use, expedites calls, provides instant ID for net.
- FCC call signs still required:
  - part 97 requires that "Each amateur station . . . must transmit its
  - assigned call sign . . . at the end of each communication, and at least every ten minutes during a communication . . . ."
- Give your tactical call with your FCC call sign for ID periodically when called by Net Control



## **Net Procedures**

#### Know what the Net procedures are

- May differ among nets
- Net Control should hold a pre-event briefing
- Ask Net Control if you are unsure
- Don't take offense if corrected
- Know why you are where you are
  - Know what you are supposed to do
  - Do that
- Listen for your Tactical Call Sign
  - May be unfamiliar with being called by other than your FCC call sign
  - Keep list of other tactical call signs being used
- Answer Promptly
  - You're where you are for a purpose
  - Net Control expects you to be at your post when called
  - Pay attention you are there to serve
  - Stay until relieved or released by Net Control
  - The call you miss may be critical





## Net Procedures (Continued)



- Get to your post early 10 to 20 minutes
  - Scope out location before hand if possible
  - Person you relieve has already stood their shift and has had enough fun
- Keep a log know what written records are required / desired for this Net
- Brief Your replacement
  - Ensure continuity of post operations
  - Give your replacement your notes/log turn in to Net Control at end of event
  - Examples of Information to pass:
    - Frequencies being used
    - Tactical call signs
    - Names of operators at other posts
    - Phone numbers
    - Maps
    - Purpose and procedures of you post
    - Events during your watch
    - Active issues, pending events
    - Location of essentials restrooms / water / food / help
    - Anything else you would want to know



# Get The Traffic Through



Work through Net Control – always

Summarize - be brief but thorough

 Use plain English – No "QSL", "10-20", "Roger-WilCo", etc

 Stop transmitting when you stop talking (No VOX or locking PTT)



## Get The Traffic Through (cont.)



No unnecessary chatter

Don't call endlessly

- 1 or 2 tries are enough
- Wait a few minutes to try again

Pause for "break-ins"

Use short simple phrases



## Get The Traffic Through (cont.)



Acknowledge transmissions to you

- Can / Will do or Can't do
- State questions in positive should be answerable by a "Yes" or "No", if possible
- Answer as directly as possible
- Know proper procedures for message handling (A future training session)
- Do let 3<sup>rd</sup> parties speak on your radio if necessary this is perfectly legal if you are there as the operator.
